

Year 12 - What Happens?

At the Post 16 Review Meeting you will talk about your future plans and aspirations. A discussion will take place to talk about how your course/training or apprenticeship is progressing.

If you are involved or may become involved with Adult Social Care in the future, discussions will be held what support you may require when you leave college or training.

Year 13 - What Happens?

You will have a review of your Education Health Care Plan (EHCP)

In the review we will talk about your future plans - is it time to move to a new setting? Everyone in the meeting will talk about how your course/training or apprenticeship is progressing. At this meeting you may discuss your new college or placement and plan for this possible transition.



Year 14 Onwards

Every year there will be a review of your Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) to see if you are continuing to make achievable academic progress and if you are meeting all of your educational targets.

We will talk a lot more about your future plans and your Pathway into Adulthood and being independent.

If you move into Higher Education (University) then your Education Health Care Plan will no longer be required.

At the age of 16 specific decision making rights about education health and care plans apply to you directly from the end of the compulsory age. However your rights to make decisions are subject to your capacity to do so as set out in the Mental Capacity Act 2005. If this is confusing, ask an adult what it means.

The young person's voice is paramount and an Advocacy Service is available to ensure the young person's voice is always heard.

Preparing for your Pathway into Adulthood

As you enter Key Stage 4 it is important that you start to think about your future, your aspirations, the career you want and how you can reach your goals. Stockton Local Authority want to help you with this and set you on the right pathway to achieve to your full potential.

Year 9 - What Happens?

You will be asked to attend a meeting with your parents to look at your hopes for your future and what you would like to do when you leave school. You can talk about your preferences, your likes, dislikes and your academic/vocational strengths.

A plan will be drawn up and this will be your Transition Plan to help you look forward, and will support you to achieve your aspirations.

Year 10 - What Happens?

You will have a review of your Education Health Care Plan (EHCP), which happens every year.

In the review you will focus on discussing Preparing for your Adulthood.

Your Transition Plan will be updated to ensure everything is in place for you.

Your Plan should be used to support you and your family to look at courses and places you would like to go to after Year 11.

You may go on visits to local colleges or training providers.

Year 11 - What Happens?

You will have a Transition Review to finalise your options for moving forward at the end of Year 11.

We will talk a lot more about which college or place you would like to go to when you leave school.

We can arrange tours and taster days so that you get to know your new placement and the staff.

We will also make a backup plan in case something changes.
