

# **Admission to school for children with an Education Health and Care Plan or a Statement of Special Educational Needs**

Guidance for admission in September 2017



# Introduction

Under the Children and Families Act 2014, children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) who meet the relevant threshold will now be supported by an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), which spans the age range from birth to 25 years, and replaces the statement of special educational needs (SEN). All existing SENs will continue to have legal status until they are formally transferred to new EHCPs.

This document specifically seeks to guide you through the process of requesting a place for your child who has an EHCP or a SEN at a school, either in starting primary school (Reception year), or transferring to junior school (Year 3) or secondary school (Year 7).

## Our commitment to you

In arranging a school place for your child, we will:

- work with you to seek you and your child's views, and consider these carefully.
- take account of your child's special educational needs and the provision required to meet them.
- offer your child a place at an appropriate educational establishment.
- in the event that a place cannot be provided at your requested school, explain the reasons for this and offer an alternative appropriate placement able to meet the needs of your child.

As a parent, you:

- have the right to express a request for the school you would like your child to attend.
- have the right to have your views considered in the process of arranging a school place.
- should consider any implications your request of school may have on your child's eligibility to receive home to school transport.

# Early Years Education

## What education is provided in Surrey for pre-school children?

Current legislation states that free part-time early years education must be available for all three and four year olds whose parents want it. In Surrey this can be provided in state funded nursery schools or in nurseries attached to infant and primary schools; in voluntary and private pre-school groups and nurseries; and in childminding networks. Places are normally provided by nursery schools or pre-schools, some of which are attached to Surrey infant or primary schools and are available mostly on a part-time basis, either in the morning or afternoon, although some settings can offer more flexibility. The page '[Free part-time nursery education in Surrey](#)' explains this in more detail and gives information about other options open to parents. You can call us on 0300 200 1004 should you require a paper copy of any of the materials listed.

If you choose for your child to attend a nursery that is attached to an infant or primary school, this does not guarantee that he or she will automatically be guaranteed a place in Reception year at that school. When the time comes for your child to start school, you will have to complete and return a primary school application form.

# Primary and Secondary Education

There are more than 350 mainstream schools and academies in Surrey, all of which are able to meet the needs of the majority of children with SEND. Every state-funded school is allocated financial resources and can access specialist professional advice to support them in meeting the needs of pupils with SEND.

If your child has a SSEN or an EHCP, your local authority is responsible for arranging their admission into a pre-school setting, school or Further Education (FE) setting. This applies whether your child is to attend a mainstream provision or whether they require a more specialised learning environment. In addition to its mainstream infant, junior, primary and secondary schools, there is also a range of special schools and specialist centres in Surrey to meet the needs of children with SSEN or EHCPs where required.

## When should my child start school in Reception?

In Surrey, your child can start school at the beginning of the school year following their fourth birthday. By law, they must be in full time education by the start of the school term following their fifth birthday.

## When should my child start junior school?

Children who attend an infant school will be required to transfer to a junior school or an all through primary school after Year 2. This should have been discussed with you in your child's annual review if it is relevant for your child. If your child is leaving Year 2 of an infant school in July 2017, you will need to apply for a Year 3 place by 31st October 2016.

### When should my child start secondary school?

If your child will reach age 11 between 1 September 2016 and 31 August 2017, they will be due to start secondary school in September 2017. You will need to apply for a place by 31 October 2016.

### Can I apply for a place outside of my child's normal age group?

If you would like your child to be educated outside their normal age group, the admission authority for each school will consider your request according to your child's circumstances and what is in their best interests. You must state clearly why you feel admission to a different year group is in your child's best interest and discuss this with your child's SEND caseworker at the earliest opportunity. ### What schools are available in Surrey?

In Surrey, children are usually admitted into the following types of school:

- *Academies* – independent of the local authority and funded directly by the Department for Education. An academy can set its own curriculum.
- *Community* – maintained by the local authority.

- *Foundation* – state funded school run by its own governing body.
- *Free school* – a type of academy set up by a group, such as parents, teachers, charities, community groups and businesses.
- *Trust* – a type of foundation school, which forms a charitable trust with an outside partner.
- *Voluntary aided* – maintained by the local authority but strongly supported by the church authorities (usually Church of England or Catholic).
- *Voluntary controlled* – maintained by the local authority but with close links with the church authorities. Some of the governing body is appointed by the religious foundation.

Parents can also choose to send their children to non-maintained schools where fees are charged for a child's education. These are schools which are not maintained by the local authority or by the Government, but could be operated by a charity or business. Typically, fees are the responsibility of the child's parent, unless the child has a SEN or EHCP and the local authority has agreed their placement.

The council is the admission authority for community and voluntary controlled schools, whilst for academies, foundation, free, trust and voluntary aided schools the governing body is the admissions authority. Admission authorities are responsible for setting and applying admission arrangements. Non maintained schools follow their own separate admissions procedures.

### **How should I select a school for my child?**

Find out as much as you can about the school.

- Read the Surrey guides "Finding the right primary school in Surrey" and "Finding the right secondary school in Surrey". These can be found on Surrey's [SEND admissions page](#).
- Look at school brochures
- Look at their website to find out their policies, especially their SEND policy and end of key stage results/achievements
- Read the latest Ofsted reports at [www.ofsted.gov.uk](http://www.ofsted.gov.uk)
- Visit the school to see them in action and talk to them about your child's specific needs
- Consider how your child would get to and from the school

### **What about my child's special educational needs?**

Wherever possible a child's special educational needs should be met in their nearest mainstream school. If your child is already in school, you should discuss this with the class teacher or the school's special educational needs coordinator (SENCO) if you have any concerns.

With your consent, your mainstream school can also make referrals to other specialist support services, who can advise on how to best meet your child's needs.

This includes:

- Educational psychology
- REMA race and ethnic minority achievement
- Physical and sensory support
- Behaviour and pupil support
- Learning and language support
- Autism and inclusion outreach
- Primary mental health worker

If it has been determined that your child may be appropriate for a special school or specialist provision place, wherever possible they should be offered a place at the nearest special or specialist provision that has been deemed suitable to meet their educational needs.

### **How does Surrey determine which is my nearest school?**

Every child will have a nearest mainstream school. This is the school which is closest to your home address by straight line distance, measured by our geographical information system from your address point to the school.

If it has been determined that your child may be appropriate for a place at a special school or specialist provision, then the nearest appropriate special/specialist school to your child's home address will also be calculated. This will be measured by straight line distance using our geographical information system from your home address to the school. The word 'appropriate' in this definition refers to the arrangement type of the school or specialist provision, for example 'Communication and Interaction Needs'. For more information about the arrangement types available in Surrey, please see read our "Finding the right school" guides on Surrey's [SEND admissions page](#).

### **Can I apply for schools outside Surrey?**

You can apply for schools outside Surrey. You should find out as much about the school as you can, in the same way you would for a Surrey school. We would also encourage you to discuss your request with your SEND case worker.

### **Can I apply for independent schools?**

You have the right to request a place at any independent school which has been approved for this purpose by the Secretary of State. The Government has a published list of [approved independent schools](#).

You may also make representation for a place at another independent or non-maintained school that is not on the Secretary of State's list above. We will consider your request and have regard to the general principle that children should be educated in accordance with their parents' wishes, but we are not under the same duty as with schools named in the list cited above.

# How do I apply for a school place?

## **My child has SEND, but does not have a SSEN or an EHCP**

If your child does not have a SSEN or an EHCP, but does have SEND, then you should apply for a mainstream school place through the Admissions and Transport Team. In line with legislation, mainstream schools are required to make reasonable adaptations to meet your child's SEND and to support them to fulfil their academic and wider potential. Further details of how to apply through the Admissions and Transport team can be found on the [mainstream admissions page](#).

If your child does not currently have a SSEN or EHCP, but is going through a statutory assessment process, please apply in the way described above, but also speak to your SEND caseworker for advice.

## **My child has a SSEN or an EHCP and is applying for a junior or secondary school place**

### ***Step One***

You should start to discuss your child's school transfer and the type of provision that may be appropriate to meet their needs at their latest annual review and at their Key Stage Transition review, usually during the summer term of Year 1 (junior applicants) or Year 5 (secondary applicants).

### ***Step Two***

Following the Key Stage Transition review, you should explore which school/s you think would be suitable to meet your child's needs, find out as much as you can about them and discuss your thoughts with your child's case worker or SENCO. You can refer to our Surrey guides "Finding the right primary school in Surrey" and "Finding the right secondary school in Surrey", which can be found on Surrey's [SEND admissions page](#).

### ***Step Three***

In the September that your child enters Year 2 (junior applicants) or Year 6 (secondary applicants), you should complete a SEND school application form and either submit this online or return it to your SEND case worker by 31 October 2016.

You will be asked to list up to three mainstream school requests on your application and if appropriate to your child, one special school or specialist provision request.

**It is important that you name more than one mainstream preference on your school application.** This is so that we can, where possible, offer an alternative placement if we are not able to offer your preference. If you only make one mainstream preference and we are not able to offer your child a place at this school, your child may then be offered a place at a mainstream school which you did not prefer.

**If you are seeking a place at a special school or specialist provision for your child, you are advised to also submit a preference for a mainstream school place.** This is because a place at a special school or specialist provision cannot be confirmed until later in the admissions process. Expressing a preference for a

mainstream school will not affect any decision regarding a child's place at special school or specialist provision.

#### **Step Four**

If you are seeking a place at a special school or specialist provision for your child, your preference will be considered at an admissions forum in November. You will be notified of the forum outcome within two weeks of the forum taking place. Forum members will include:

- the head teachers (or their representatives) of the relevant schools catering for the particular need group
- a senior SEN manager, who will chair the forum
- a nominated note taker, who will record decisions
- representatives from specialist support services
- a Surrey SEND Information Advice and Support Service (SSIASS) representative, who acts as an independent observer

If your child is not allocated a place at your preferred school, the reason will be explained to you. The local authority will then work with you to seek an appropriate alternative school placement for your child, which you will be invited to visit.

#### **Step Five**

A draft version of your child's EHCP or SSEN will be sent to you. You have 15 days to respond to this draft to exercise your right to request a particular school to be named in the plan, or to request any other amendments.

#### **Step Six**

A finalised EHCP or SSEN, typically naming a school placement for your child will be issued by 15th February 2017.

#### **Step Seven**

If you disagree with the school placement named in your child's EHCP, you have the right of appeal to an SEND tribunal. Details of this process will be provided to you with the school place offer and you can then contact SSIASS for further information and advice on this process.

## **My child has a SSEN or an EHCP and is applying to start school in Reception**

#### **Step One**

You should discuss your child's needs in good time with your child's current educational provision (nursery school etc) and any professionals involved in their case.

#### **Step Two**

You should consider which school/s you think would be suitable to meet your child's needs, find out as much as you can about them and discuss your thoughts with your child's SEND case worker. You can also refer to our guide "Finding the right primary school in Surrey".

#### **Step Three**

In the September before your child is due to start school, you should complete a SEND school application form and either submit this online, or return it to your case worker by 15 January 2017.

You will be asked to list up to three mainstream school requests on your application and if appropriate to your child, one special school or specialist provision request.

**It is important that you name more than one mainstream preference on your school application.** This is so that we can, where possible, offer an alternative placement if we are not able to offer your preference. If you only make one mainstream preference and we are not able to offer your child a place at this school, your child may then be offered a place at a mainstream school which you did not prefer.

**If you are seeking a place at a special school or specialist provision for your child, you are advised to also submit a preference for a mainstream school place.** This is because a place at a special school or specialist provision cannot be confirmed until later in the admissions process. Expressing a preference for a mainstream school will not affect any decision regarding a child's place at special school or specialist provision.

#### ***Step Four***

If you are seeking a place at a special school or specialist provision, your request will be considered at an admissions forum in March 2017 and you will be notified of the outcome for your child within two weeks of the forum taking place. Forum members will include:

- the head teachers (or their representatives) of the relevant schools catering for the particular need group
- a senior SEN manager, who will chair the forum
- a nominated note taker, who will record decisions
- representatives from the specialist support services
- a Surrey SEND Information Advice and Support Service (SSIASS) representative, who acts as an independent observer

If your child has not been allocated a place at your requested school, the reason will be explained to you and the local authority will work with you to seek an appropriate alternative school placement for your child, which you will be invited to visit.

#### ***Step Five***

A draft version of your child's EHCP or SSEN will be sent to you. You have 15 days to respond to this draft to exercise your right to request a particular school to be named in the plan, or to request any other amendments.

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# Travel assistance

Surrey County Council (SCC) will provide travel assistance for children attending the nearest school to their home which is appropriate to meet their needs, where the distance between their home and the school is more than:

- 2 miles for children in school years Reception - Year 3
- 3 miles for children in school years 4 – 11

In circumstances where SCC has complied with a parental request for a school that is not the nearest appropriate school to the home address, transport assistance will not normally be provided, even if the above home to school distances are met. In these cases, parent/carers will be responsible for ensuring that their child gets to school.

However, we will ensure that children and young people are assessed for transport assistance on an individual basis and any decision about travel assistance will be based on individual needs. This means that we will also look at a family's extended eligibility for travel assistance if they are in receipt of the maximum level of Working Tax Credit or if your child is in receipt of Free School Meals.

You can apply for transport assistance through your SEND caseworker, who can send you an application form and a copy of the travel assistance policy if you are unable to read it online.

# Frequently asked questions

## **Can I appeal against the decision not to offer the school I requested?**

If your child is not given a place at your requested school, you do have a right of appeal to an independent special educational needs and disability (SEND) tribunal after your child's EHCP has been issued. Further information about this process will be given to you at the time, if it may be relevant to your case.

You should note that any decision made by the SEND tribunal is final and binding upon the authority, the parents and the school. Further appeals within the same academic year can only be considered on a point of law and not on the decision of the tribunal.

## **Can I move my child to another school other than at the usual age of transfer?**

If you are thinking about changing your child's school, you should consider this decision very carefully, bearing in mind that other schools may be full and that the upheaval may be damaging to your child's progress.

You should make sure that you discuss any concerns with your child's current headteacher, class teacher or special educational needs coordinator to try to sort out any issues of concern and consider a referral to external specialist support services.

We would also encourage you to discuss the situation with your SEND caseworker.

## **What if I have a complaint about my child's school?**

In the event of a complaint it is in the best interests of the child or young person to deal with it as quickly and effectively as possible. You should approach the headteacher of your child's school in the first instance, but if this does not resolve the issue, you can call us on 03456 009 009 for a copy of our complaints procedure leaflet.
